Who We Are

An all volunteer 501(C3) rescue group in Sioux Falls South Dakota, Sioux Empires mission is to promote responsible Pit Bull ownership, provide breed education, combat pet overpopulation, and find qualified homes for sound Pit Bull dogs in South Dakota as well as in other states.

Adopting a Pit Bull

As for adopting a Pit Bull, they are wonderful dogs for the right family! Pit Bulls are very intelligent and they need a structured home that will teach them how to be well mannered and socialized. Pit Bulls are not a type of dog you adopt to ignore and leave on the end of a chain. Pit Bulls are great in families with kids. They are rough and tumble type dogs that are not easily scared or hurt-making them a great jungle gym. Pit Bulls love their owners with a heart and devotion unlike any other breed and with this kind of admiration comes great responsibility! To know the love of a Pit Bull is like none other and families that are responsible, committed owners know their dogs are well worth it!

We DO NOT make same sex-placements or place Pit Bulls in multiple dog homes. We might place a Pit Bull in a home with a compatible dog of the opposite sex, but we ask our adopters to follow certain safety measures - never leave the dogs unsupervised, always monitor roughhousing, avoid triggers that could cause conflicts such as bones, toys, etc. We also ask that the dogs we place NOT be taken to dog parks. Dogs are adopted as inside family members only!

Salsa ... Waiting for Her Forever Home

Miss Salsa, currently our longest member of Sioux Empire Pit Rescue, has been patiently awaiting her family to find her since May 2011. She's shared her foster home with numerous others that have come and gone, but somehow hasn't been as lucky as the rest of them. She takes it all in stride and is certainly adored by her foster family. That wasn't always the case however.

Salsa was found by Animal Control in Kansas City, MO. Her body was merely a skeleton covered in fur. She weighed right around 30 pounds when she was taken in. Within 2 weeks time Salsa had gained enough weight that she was ready to take on the world and find a new home. The beautiful copper colored girl was a bit apprehensive when she arrived at SEPR, but we promised her we would care for her until the right family came along.

Unfortunately, Salsa was probably not socialized properly as a pup and can be a bit rough while playing. She also doesn't want any other animal taking her food or treats from her. It's hard for her to trust after she has obviously not known where her next meal would come from.

The bond that has been built between foster family and Salsa has grown. She has learned about trust, about what to expect, and about unacceptable behavior. This by no means makes her perfect, but it does make her easier to handle. She is a true pit bull and does become quite anxious and excited when another animal is near. We call that a work in progress, but in the meantime, we believe



that she would be the perfect candidate for being the only pet in the house.

The little red-nose pit bull is wonderful with humans of any size or gender and only wants to be by your side, or right on top of you.

The little adventure seeker loves to be outside with you where she can run and play, carry around toys, and chase her treat ball. She is excellent to take in the car, and has absolutely no qualms about being in her crate when home alone. She does fairly good on a leash, but even better while wearing her gentle leader. Salsa, and the rest of the group continue to share her story through SEPR's website (www.pitrescue.weebly.com) and Facebook page. Do's and Don'ts for Children and Dogs

- Even if you know the dog, always ask permission to pet it from the owner first.
- Even when you have permission, don't invade the dog's body space. Allow the dog to come up to you and sniff the top of your closed fist (palm down). If the dog doesn't want to come and greet you, respect that and leave it alone. Don't approach a dog from behind. Don't pet a dog directly on the top of its head. This could be threatening for the dog because the top of its head can be very sensitive, so it is best to pet on the back or chest.
- Never stare at a dog and never put your face close to a dog's face. Remember to look at the dog briefly and then look away, look at the dog, and look away. These are calming signals and you are telling the dog that you are no threat.
- Do not tease a dog.
- Do not touch a dog that has been tied up or left at the end of a chain in a yard, outside a store or behind a fence.
- Do not touch a dog while it is eating. You wouldn't want a dog to come and take what you are eating, so respect that its food is its food and you should not go near it.
- Don't scream and run away from a dog. If a strange dog comes up to you and you are scared, fold your arms, stand still, look away, and completely ignore it until it loses interest in you and goes away. The more boring you can be the less the dog will want to interact with you
- Remember that a dog is an animal and not a cuddly toy. Some dogs don't like being hugged. Be gentle with any dog and do not engage in rough play.
